Seaton Delaval Hall had a stall promoting their summer activities and celebrating the bats that roost at the Hall. Guests could also get a Henna tattoo or have their faces painted.

The Tyneside Gymnastics Club wowed the crowd with their impressive skills, while a magician kept both children and adults entertained with magic tricks.

Children enjoyed the laser quest, merry-go-round, bouncy castle, slide, and wipeout, while various games and activities like chess and archery kept them entertained throughout the event.



Thanks to the dedication of the Community Association Committee and the countless volunteers who worked tirelessly to make the fair a success, everyone who attended had a great time.

Party in the Park

The Astley Park Community Partnership hosted an incredible Party in the Park at Astley Park in Seaton Delaval on Saturday 6 July.

Despite the weather trying its hardest to dampen the spirits of those attending, a fantastic crowd of residents gathered at the park to enjoy the fun and soak up the lively atmosphere.

Market stalls, face painting, and the main stage were all set up around the pavilion, where attendees were treated to a spectacular showcase of talent. The Astley High School year 10 band made their public debut, alongside performances by the Cramlington Community Choir, Blyth Tall Ships Shanty Singers, Jason King, and Tony the Toucan.

There was no shortage of activities for families to enjoy, including a children's magician, balloon animals, sports, family games, and even inflatables including a slide, penalty shootout and a play centre disco castle on the grassed area.

There were delicious food options available - from the Scouts cooking up sausages, an Ice Cream van, and free candy floss. Inside the pavilion, a pop-up café served up tasty treats, hot dogs, and refreshing beverages.

If you fancied something new, Astley Park Bowling Club offered Lawn Bowls taster sessions on the bowling green.

Thanks to the hard work of the community partnership and all the volunteers involved in the event. It was a day filled with fun, entertainment, and community spirit.



Skateboarding Sessions

Building on the success of last year, there have been more free skateboarding sessions held at Seghill, Seaton Delaval, Seaton Sluice, and New Hartley throughout June and July.

The response from the young people and their families who attended these sessions has been incredible. After hearing feedback from the young people in Seaton Valley expressing their desire for more skateboarding activities, last year we collaborated with the Northumberland County Council Sports Development Team and Pop More Skate School to make it happen. We funded free sessions last summer catering for beginners all the way up to advanced skateboarders.

Due to the overwhelming popularity of these sessions, we decided to continue offering them this summer, with funding coming from our sports and activities budget.

Pop More Skate School has been instrumental in providing sessions for skaters of all levels. From beginner sessions for under and over 8s to Improver Sessions for those with a grasp of the basics that want a few tips on how to have more fun on their skateboards.



All the necessary skateboarding equipment, including boards, knee, elbow, and wrist guards, and helmets, was provided. The sessions featured guidance on basic skills, cruising, balance techniques, and ramp challenges.



Dave from Pop More Skate School expressed his excitement, stating...

"We are thrilled to partner with councils and schools to offer these skateboarding sessions. It's been a joy to see everyone involved having fun and improving their skills along the way. A main impediment to the uptake of the sport has been a lack of progressive, well-designed skatepark facilities in the region. Our participants are looking forward to the new park in Blyth where they'll be able to continue pursuing the sport and increasing their skills and confidence in an accessible and FUN new outdoor skatepark facility."

MAKE-UP OF THE COUNCIL

There has been one election held during the period of the report. Our ward councillors are:

NEIGHBOURHOOD PARTNERSHIP WITH NORTHUMBERLAND COUNTY COUNCIL (NCC)

The relationship between NCC and Seaton Valley remains productive, and feedback from residents suggests that the standard of work is well-regarded.

The partnership agreement ensures an enhanced service across Seaton Valley, including:

- Additional grass cutting during the summer
- Additional weed spraying
- A 3-year rotational program of edging and hedging

The council conducted a review of contractual performance during 2023-24 and because of the continued collaboration and standards of service, opted to extend the Neighbourhood Partnership with the county council – the current contract runs until March 2026. This extension also gives the county council time to complete its own internal review of statutory and enhanced service standards, the outcome of which the council will consider in due course.

FLORAL PLANTING

Similarly to the Neighbourhood Partnership, the council has remained satisfied with the county council's performance in this area of work.



The county council has worked positively with the council to manage spring and summer displays and has been responsive to changes in weather and suggestions from council members.

Given the success of the current Floral Planting services, the council has taken the option to also extend this contract for a further two years (to March 2026) pending the outcome of the county council's service review.

PROMOTING SEATON VALLEY

Our website and social media channels have been updated regularly throughout the year with local news and events, including road closures, progress with the Northumberland Line, planning applications, and voting information for residents. We have also helped to promote several other services and organisations in the area such as our Community Associations, Northumberland County Council, Carers Northumberland (who we also host the council offices the second Wednesday of each month), Age UK, and activities for children and young people.

We continue to publish the council's quarterly Futures magazine, which remains well received by residents. The council established a small working group during 2023 with the aim of improving and expanding the content of the magazine.

As in previous years, we held our annual photography competition, and this year's competition attracted over 210 entries across the five competition categories. The council proudly displays the collection of winning entries, which really capture life in the Seaton Valley.

PLAY PARKS

We have 15 play parks that we maintain in Seaton Valley. The council works closely with the county council to carry out a schedule of fortnightly inspections and complete repairs and maintenance work as and when required. Some repairs have taken longer than anticipated due to outsourcing, and the council has made several budgetary adjustments to improve this situation in 2024-25.

Painting of the Dunes Play Park at Seaton Sluice has been delayed on several occasions due to the inclement weather but remains a priority for the council in the forthcoming year.

SEATON VALLEY IN BLOOM

The council continues to allocate a modest annual budget to help In Bloom groups with the purchasing of bulbs, plants, trees, and tubs etc. We also help to coordinate the activities of the various village groups and share best practice.

Holywell In Bloom received more awards in this year's Northumbria In Bloom competition, including a Gold Award in the Large Village category and a Judge's Discretionary Award for the Old Man's Hut. The group was also nominated to represent Northumbria in the National Britain In Bloom competition this year, which takes place in Summer 2024. We expect to know the result of the competition in the Autumn of 2024.

Thanks to a nomination from Holywell In Bloom, a member of staff from the county council team also won the title of Community Champion.

Thanks to the work of the New Hartley In Bloom group, New Hartley's Memorial Garden also received an Outstanding Level 5 2023 It's Your Neighbourhood Award from the Royal Horticultural Society.

GARDENING COMPETITION

We had an excellent response to our Gardening competition this year, and we were delighted to see 24 entries, including ten from New Hartley, six from Seaton Delaval, one from Seghill, three from Seaton Sluice and four from Holywell.

We gave out seven awards in total, including Best Overall Winner for 2023, which was awarded to a resident in New Hartley.



CHRISTMAS EVENTS

Our village Christmas events were well attended in all five villages as usual this year.

Our Christmas Light competition, which we run in collaboration with the village's first schools each year, was

a great success once more. The winning designs were made into garlands and the winners turn on their lights, the village lights, and the Christmas tree lights at the event.

This year, we trialled the use of a professional Santa Claus in two of the villages, which proved a great success and added a little extra magic on the day. As a result of the positive feedback from residents, we intend to employ the services of a professional Santa Claus for all five events in 2024.

After some feedback about photography at the events and use of the images captured, we will be adopting a revised policy at the events in 2024 to ensure all residents are well-informed.



CHRISTMAS PRESENT APPEAL

Our Christmas Present Appeal was less successful this year as we had less engagement than in previous years and families who were referred needed gifts for older children.

The council will consider alternative approaches to support families during 2024 and advertise the services nearer the time.

ALLOTMENTS

Income from allotment rents is ring-fenced each year and invested in repairs, maintenance, and improvements to the allotment sites. This investment includes staffing, materials, and services. We continue to maintain our allotment sites and carry out perimeter fencing work as and when required.

Allotment demand across Seaton Valley has continued to out-strip capacity and the council continuously reviews its waiting list to ensure it remains up to date. At the end of March 2024, there were 40 residents on the waiting list.

We have continued our strategy of clearing and reducing the size of larger plots to increase capacity and we have re-let several vacant plots over the course of the year. Our overall occupancy rates have remained stable at an estimated 90%.

As the number of plots and tenants has increased, so too has the workload, particularly in relation to clearing and re-letting vacant plots. The council has recognised the need for additional staffing resource and agreed to the appointment of an additional part-time Allotments and General Maintenance Assistant during the 2024-25 budget planning process.

In September of 2023, council officers proposed plans to improve access and safety for tenants and their families on the Dene Top site after identifying some areas of possible erosion. Over the course of the next few months, heavy rainfall resulted in several significant slippages along the site and council was forced to delay its plans.

Following preliminary advice from several professional sources in January 2024, access to Dene Top along the footpath was prohibited to ensure the safety of tenants and visitors, and tenants were informed by telephone and letter.

In March 2024, after further erosion and slippages, the council was forced to treat the entire site as high risk and completely prohibit access pending engagement of an independent engineering agency and a full assessment. An engineering agency was appointed at the end of March with plans to conclude their assessment in April 2024. We will continue to work with our insurers and solicitors and those allotment holders affected by this situation to find a safe and sustainable solution for their individual needs, within our powers and budget.

ENVIRONMENTAL ENFORCEMENT

In addition to providing free dog-poo bags from the council offices, the council continued to fund an enhancement to the statutory services of the county council during the early part of 2023-24. However, following resignation of the additional Environmental Enforcement Officer employed by the county council, and withdrawal of funding from other local councils, the council conducted a review of its impact. As a result of their findings, and due to very low reports of dog-fouling through the council offices, the council decided not to increase the budget, thus ending the enhanced service.

We continue to provide free dog-poo bags and are now encouraging residents to report any issues with dog-fouling through the county council's FixMyStreet online service. Any residents without online access can report issues through the council office who will report the issue to FixMyStreet on their behalf. The council continues to monitor the number of reports and to ensure that the county council delivers the required statutory services within Seaton Valley.

BUS SHELTERS

All bus shelters were repaired and painted in the last quarter of 2023-24, helping to improve their appearance and give the area a boost.

Seats inside the bus shelters were then sanded and stained where required and this work will continue into 2024-25.

The process of replacing damaged Perspex panels with metal ones continues.



LEISURE AND COMMUNITY ACTIVITIES

We continue our successful partnership with the county council's Sports Development Team, providing funding for school holiday activities and leisure opportunities within our villages.

The activities funded by the council are offered during every school holiday, excluding Christmas, and include multi-sports, football, tennis and cricket camps that are free of charge for residents. Additionally, we have funded free packed lunches for all children attending these camps.

The Sports Development Team delivered skateboarding taster sessions during the summer holidays in 2023. These sessions proved to be very popular, and we are supporting more sessions in 2024.

Our funding also contributes to the Sports Development Team's assistance with the main village fairs during the summer, as well as a variety of weekly activities for both young and mature residents. This includes conducting surveys to determine which activities are most appealing to our residents.

As a community council we have continued to support events and activities in all the villages, including summer fairs, the Hester Pit Memorial service and King Charles III Coronation events.

The council co-ordinated a consultation exercise in response to the Boundary Commission's recommendations including the proposal to divide the village of New Hartley in two, which was subsequently withdrawn. The next local elections in 2025 will be held under the new wards finally agreed.



YOUTH SERVICES

In June 2023, the council was advised by a representative of Northumberland County Council (NCC) that sessional youth workers had been served with their notice of redundancy and advised that their services would no longer be required from September 2023.

As a result of the county council's decision, which was made without consultation, the Youth Club in Astley Park on a Tuesday night and any youth outreach work in the Seaton Valley villages would end in September 2023 unless either Seaton Valley Council or community groups could fund a similar service.

In response to the county council withdrawing this service, a Seaton Valley Youth Provision Working Group was formed in August 2023, consisting of representatives from the village community associations, Blyth Valley CVA, the Scouts and staff from Seaton Valley Council.

The Working Group and Seaton Valley Council are now working in partnership with Children North East (NE) to provide a weekly youth club in Astley Park and youth outreach work in New Hartley, Seaton Sluice and Seghill.

The Working Group have provided an initial, one-off funding payment to Children NE towards the cost of the Astley Park Youth Club and Children NE have successfully applied for an EDF grant to match this funding. The youth club is scheduled to start at the end of April and will run every Tuesday evening except for school holidays.

In the council's budget for 2024/25, the council have earmarked funding for Children NE to deliver outreach youth work in Seghill, New Hartley and Seaton Sluice. It is hoped this service will start before the summer of 2024.

PUBLIC TOILETS

The council stepped in with funding to ensure the public toilets in Seaton Delaval and West Terrace in Seaton Sluice remain open all year round and after several years of evidence to confirm the need for this facility, the county council has confirmed it will fund the service itself. This is great news and frees up a small amount of funding in the 2024-25 budget for other services and projects.

FOOD PARCEL DISTRIBUTION

The council, in partnership with Blyth Food Bank, continues to provide a food parcel distribution service from our offices in Seaton Delaval giving residents access to a more local and convenient collection location.

We also have several food bank donation points in shops, schools, community centres and Seaton Delaval Hall. These are emptied on a regular basis and the donations taken to the Blyth Food Bank. The council also processes regular donations from residents and ensures these are passed on to the Food Bank.

In 2023-24, we received 160 food parcel referrals, and we gave out 274 food parcels to support families and individuals in Seaton Valley. This is a reduction from 372 in 2022-2023.

Desktop Analysis of the Council's Income and Expenditure —

WHERE DOES OUR MONEY COME FROM?

Approximately 91% of the Council's total income of £673,080 in 2023/24 came from its annual precept which it served on Northumberland County Council. The Council's precept was £604,410 which is collected via residents' Council Tax bills. Seaton Valley Community Council's Band D Equivalent Council Tax for 2023/24 was £125.99, which equated to approximately £2.42 per week.

Additionally, the Council collects rent on the two flats it owns above its offices (£11,375) and on the allotment sites it manages throughout the Valley (£17,905). In total this income amounted to £29,280 in 2023/24.

Miscellaneous income, including bank interest and advertising income, amounted to £31,390 and the Council processed internal recharges to services of £8,000 giving total income for the year of £673,080.

WHERE DO WE SPEND OUR MONEY?

In 2023/24 the Council spent **£594,045** on a range of services, salaries and running costs. These costs are summarised in the Pie Chart below.



RESERVES

As at the 31 March 2024, the Council's useable reserves totalled **£295,970** a breakdown of which is shown in the table to the right:

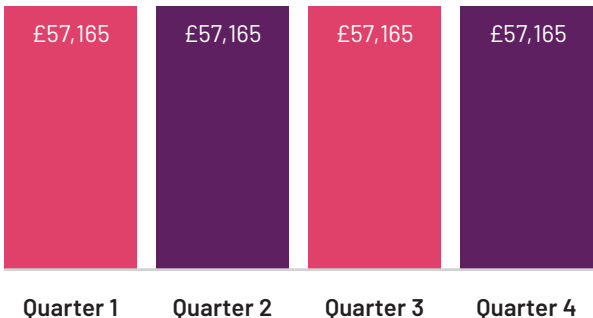
